

## YALE TEAM WON AT TRAPS.

Beat Crescent A. C. Gunners by Three Targets for Carteret Cup.

By the narrow margin of three clay targets Yale's team of gunners yesterday won the inter-club team shoot. The competition was held at the traps of the Cartaret Gun Club, Garden City, L. I., under conditions of strong and shifting winds that severely tested the marksmanship of the gunners. Yale's team scored a total of 204 out of a possible 250, with the team of the Crescent Athletic Club second with a total of 201. The Carteret Gun Club team was third with 191.

The shooting for the individual high score cup, offered by Albert R. Fish of the Crescent Athletic Club, was also close. It was won by J. S. S. Remsen, Captain of the Crescent team, with a total of 49 targets out of a possible 50. Clarence H. King, Yale, 1907, was second to the veteran Remsen with 46 "kills."

The Country Club of Westchester, the Nassau Country Club, and the Carteret Gun Club also had teams in the field, but all fell below the 200 mark.

In every particular the shooting of Capt. Remsen for Crescent and of King for Yale provided the feature of the day. They were in the last squad to face the traps. Two misses for King and a perfect score of 25 for Capt. Remsen would have tied the score. Every member of the competing teams and a large gallery of spectators lined back on the shooting platform to witness the test of steady nerve, quick eye, and judgment.

Capt. Remsen had previously shot 25 clay targets that took the place of birds, while King had only "killed" 22 on the first of his score. It was regarded as a sure victory for Crescent, but King displayed a splendid degree of accuracy. He winged the clays up to the seventeenth, which he missed, but his shot found all the others to the end. Capt. Remsen missed the nineteenth, and on this even shooting Yale carried off the handsome cup. The scores:

Stevens Institute lacrosse team defeated the Cornell team at the St. George Cricket Grounds yesterday by a score of 5 to 0. The game started with a moderate pace, which was maintained throughout the game. During the first half two goals were shot for Stevens and in the second half they caged the ball three times. The attacking was done almost entirely by the Stevens men, but the score was held down by the admirable work of the Cornell goal keeper, who stopped repeated shots. In the second half McDonald of Cornell fell on his wrist and sprained it badly. He had to leave the game, and as Cornell had no substitutes McKinley of Stevens was also put out. ## MOTOR CAR CHAMPIONSHIP.

Will Be Based on Points Won in National Circuit Race Meets.

An important decision regarding the motor car championship for 1905 has just been determined by the Racing Committee of the American Automobile Association. The championship will be decided on the point system, and the race upon which the points will be based will be the free-for-all contest. It is stipulated that this event must not be less than five miles nor more than ten miles in length. The winning car will receive four points, the second two points, and the third one point.

These points for the championship will be awarded in the National circuit meet, as sanctioned by the American Automobile Association. Not all the meets sanctioned will necessarily be in the National circuit, as several of the local track contests are not in the circuit. The circuit automobile racing dates, as at present sanctioned, are:

- June 10—Morris Park, New York City; June 16-17—Hartford, Conn.; June 21—Baltimore, Md.; June 24—Philadelphia, Penn.; June 28-29—Pittsburg; July 3-4—A. A. A. meet, Morris Park; July 22—Empire City track; Aug. 1-2—Grand Rapids, Mich.; Aug. 4-5—Detroit; Aug. 11-12—Cleveland; Aug. 18-19—Buffalo; Aug. 26—To be granted; Sept. 4—Boston; Sept. 9—Providence; Sept. 23—Morris Park; Sept. 29—Poughkeepsie; Sept. 30—Empire City track.
