YALE TEAM WON AT TRAPS.

Beat Crescent A. C. Gunners by Targets for Carteret Cup.

By the narrow margin of three clay targets Yale's team of gunners yesterday won the interclub team' shoot. The competition was held at the traps of the Cartaret Gun Club, Garden City, L. I., under conditions of strong and shifting winds that severely tested the marksmanship of the gunners. Yale's team scored a total of 204 out of a possible 250, with the team of the Crescent Athletic Club second with a total of 201.
